Writing Workshop: All the Water in Wyoming

he Natrona County Library will sponsor a free writing workshop by Lori Howe on Monday, June 13 at 5:30 p.m. in the Crawford Room. Join Wyoming landscape poet, Lori Howe, in writing on the meanings of water in Wyoming. Whether via poetry or personal essay, your knowledge, memories, and thoughts are the ink on the page in this workshop, which features a dedicated issue of "Clerestory: Poems of the Mountain West." When participants leave the workshop, they will have a strong framework and approach for writing creatively about matters of great importance to them as Wyoming citizens, drawing on their own knowledge and experience to add their voices critically and meaningfully to ongoing, community and state conversations - some, through the venue of publication.

Lori Howe is the author of "Cloudshade: Poems of the High Plains" and "Voices at Twilight: A Poet's Guide to Wyoming Ghost Towns." She has taught English and creative writing workshops the last decade at the University of Wyoming and Laramie County Community College (Laramie and Cheyenne campuses). She holds degree in a Bachelor's English and Spanish, Master's degree English, an M.F.A. Creative Writing UW, and is a doctoral candidate in Literacy Studies at UW, with a focus on critical thinking

skills and creativity for struggling writers. She teaches workshops for the Wyoming Latina project and the Wyoming Writing Project, and has been a guest poet on Wyoming Public Radio. She is editor in chief of "Clerestory: Poems of the Mountain West," an online literary magazine dedicated to showcasing the work of Wyoming writers.

All the Water in Wyoming



is presented by the Wyoming Humanities Council as part of its ThinkWY Road Scholars Tours program. The Wyoming Humanities Council provides public humanities-based programs in partnership with local organizations and is funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities with additional support from private donors and the Wyoming Legislature.

UNDERSTANDING LITERACY

One of the primary missions of the Library is to promote literacy. Literacy is generally regarded as the ability to read and write. As a repository for books, the Library does quite well in

promoting this traditional sense of literacy. Literate comes from the Latin litteratus, which can also be translated as 'lettered' or 'learned.' Through various programs and the addition of the Library's patron technology specialist, the Library is actively embracing this wider definition of the word literacy.

The Children's Department focuses quite heavily on early literacy. The Storytime program

recently was renamed to Launching Little Learners in order to promote the idea that we are doing more than simply reading stories. Children who attend Launching Little Learners are learning social skills — how to listen to and interact with others. Programming for Tweens and Teens also focus on creativity and critical thinking.

The Adult Services Department promotes numerous computer classes each month. These classes cover basic to intermediate level information on a wide variety of topics such as social media,

> operation computer maintenance. and using Microsoft products such as Word and Excel. We also partner with local organizations teach patrons about insurance. genealogy. financial aid for students. The patron technology specialist teaches patrons about many aspects of technology through computer classes and one-onone training sessions.

Library Foundation Assists in Facility Needs Assessment



n 2014, a report was commissioned by the Natrona County Library Board of Trustees to evaluate the current facility for life safety issues. This report, completed in February 2015 by GSG Architecture, found that remediating the current facility would include the abatement of hazardous materials, the provision of a new fire suppression and alarm system, and the addition of new stairwell enclosures and exterior exits. The report found that the cost for these life safety improvements would reach nearly \$4 million and would require a construction window of 16 months.

Following the release of the report, a joint committee was formed with representatives from the Natrona County Commission, the Casper City Council and the Natrona County School District to determine whether to remediate the existing library facility or build a new facility.

To assist the Joint Commission in this decision, the Library Foundation hired a consultant to undertake an assessment of the service and space needs of the library. A similar assessment was conducted ten years ago. However, the service landscape has changed since then. Technologies that are commonplace today — smartphones, tablets — were brand new or nonexistent then. And while library collections are now becoming leaner on a nationwide basis, the role of libraries in economic and community development, literacy programming and other services influence facility use and space requirements. Local governments and public libraries must approach the projection of future service needs differently than they did ten years ago.

The needs assessment will include a review of the current facility (and past space assessments), an analysis of current and projected use patterns and trends, a comparison with peer libraries, and recommendations for a revised estimate of space and use needs. The report will be presented to the Commission in early summer.






May the 4th Be With You
