To foster closer relations between the Natrona County Library and the citizens of Natrona County; to promote the functions, resources, services and needs of the Library, its patrons, and related programs; to advocate in the development of programs for the extension and improvement of the Library services and resources; to support provisions for adequate housing, materials, and other facilities of the Library; to promote and support literacy in the community.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I NAME AND CAPITAL STOCK

Section 1

The name of this corporation is Friends of the Natrona County Public Library. This corporation is not organized for direct gain and holds a nonprofit 501(c)(3) designation under the laws of the State of Wyoming relating to corporations. The corporation has no capital stock. No certificates or shares shall be issued.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

Section 1

The purpose of this organization is to foster closer relations between the Natrona County Public Library and the citizens of Natrona County; to promote the functions, resources, services and needs of the Library, its patrons, and related programs; to advocate in the development of pro- grams for the extension and improvement of the Library services and resources; to support provi- sions for adequate housing, materials, and other facilities of the Library; to promote and support literacy in the community.

ARTICLE III BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1

The business, property and affairs of the Friends of the Library shall be managed and controlled by a Board of Directors consisting of up to twelve members. Directors shall be elected by the membership each year at the annual meeting and shall hold office for a term of two years. Director terms shall begin following the annual meeting of the Board of Directors. In addition to the elected members of the Board of Directors, the Library Director and a member of the Natrona County Library Board shall serve as ex-officio members with voting privileges. The Board of Directors has the power to fill all vacancies on the Board caused by death, resignation, removal or refusal to serve. The term being filled will end at time the original term would end.

Section 2

In addition to the Section 1 provisions, the Board may include a member of the Library profes- sional staff and the immediate past president, as ex-officio members with voting privileges.

Section 3

The offices of the Board shall include President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Other officers may be elected or appointed in accordance with the provisions of this article.

Section 4

Those present at any meeting of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transac- tion of business.

Section 5

The Board of Directors is authorized to accept gifts of money or property, provided all gifts shall be used for the purposes of the corporation as defined by its Articles of Incorporation.

Section 6

Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held each month at a time and place as the President shall designate; provided that the secretary shall give written or verbal notice. Mem- bers of the Board of Directors are charged with responsibility of attending all meetings insofar as possible. Nonattendance at regular meetings may be grounds for replacement.

Section 7

The fiscal year of the Board of Directors is January 1 through December 31.

Section 8

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors will be held following the end of the fiscal year.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

Section 1

The officers of the corporation shall include President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Officers shall serve for a term of two years and shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors. Officers may be re-elected to additional two year terms.

Section 2

A vacancy in any office may be filled by the Board for the unexpired term of office.

Section 3

The Board may remove any officer whenever, in its judgment, the best interest of the Board would be served by the officer's removal.

Section 4

The President is the principal executive officer of the corporation and shall preside at all meet- ings of the Board of Directors; shall, in general, supervise and control the functions and activities of the Board, shall, with the Secretary, execute all deeds,

mortgages and contracts and shall per- form other duties as may be assigned to him or her by the Board of Directors.

Section 5

The Vice-President shall assume all the duties, responsibilities and powers of the President in the absence of the President or if the President is unable to act. The Vice-President shall coordinate the preparation of an annual report and shall present that report to the Board at the annual meet- ing.

Section 6

The Secretary shall maintain all records and communications of the corporation; shall dissemi- nate all minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors; and shall perform other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors.

Section 7

The Treasurer shall collect, receive, and be responsible for all monies of the corporation and shall deposit same in the depository named by resolution of the Board of Directors. He or she shall give no bond for the faithful performance of duties unless the Board of Directors shall re- quire such bond. The President and Treasurer will have access to a debit card drawn upon the corporation's depository. Disbursements by check will be drawn upon the corporation's deposi- tory. Checks shall be signed by the Treasurer and either the President or Vice-President. At all appointed times, the books shall be opened for inspection by members of the Board of Directors and contributors to the corporation. The Treasurer shall file all state and federal reports and tax returns in a timely manner. The fiscal year of the corporation shall be January 1 through December 31. The Treasurer will file a financial report at each Board meeting and will present the in- come tax statement to the Board upon completion.

Section 8

Each officer and committee chairperson will submit an annual report to the Vice-President at the end of each fiscal year. The Vice-President will compile a complete annual report of finances and activities to be submitted to the Library Board and presented to the Friends of the Library Board at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE V COMMITTEES

Section 1

The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Immediate Past-President. The Executive Committee is charged with the responsibility of exercising, in the intervals between the meetings of the Board of Directors, such lesser powers as may, by vote of the Board of Directors be authorized.

Section 2

There shall be a nominating Committee of members of the Board appointed by the President. The President shall serve on the committee in an ex-officio capacity. The Nominating Committee is responsible for presenting a slate of officers and directors the month prior to the Annual Meeting.

Section 3

The Sales committee will consist of the committee chairperson and designees. The commit- tee is responsible for scheduling and coordinating sales.

Section 4

There may be other committees as the President may designate, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors. Committee chairmen, who are not elected members of the Board, are ex-of- ficio members of the Board of Directors, while acting as committee chairmen.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

Section 1

These By-Laws, or any part thereof, may be abridged, altered, added to or repealed at any regular or special meeting of the Friends of the Library Board by a two-thirds vote of those present.

Section 2

The By-Laws herein contained have been passed, approved and adopted by the members of the Natrona County Friends of the Library this 15th of November, 1977 and amended as indicated.

Presidents' Report

Presidents' Report 2022

2022 was an exciting year for the Friends of Natrona County Library. We held a total of five sales including a special Star Trek sale with items donated by a local donor. The income from the sales topped \$29,000 for the year. The reservation system for book sales continues to be an excellent tool for us to manage the sale admissions as well as a good source of funding in conjunction with the sales. The income from reservations this year brought in 31% of the total sales income.

This year we also celebrated 50 years of book sales with a special recognition event in November along with our annual staff recognition. At that event, we were pleased to honor relatives of long time volunteers Betty Ouderkirk and Wilma Bovie. We also honored Kevin Anderson who has been a customer since the first sale. A pamphlet about the history of the organization was also created.

We continued providing materials for the Junk Journal classes that are taught by one of the Friends of the Library volunteers. We also continued to provide books for the ephemera shelf at the library. Our outreach donations were larger than ever with an increasing number of donation requests.

Amazon sales continued to be moderately successful. With these sales, unique and rare items commanded much higher prices than they would at our local sales. The total income from this was over \$1,100 this year.

During the year, we were able to donate \$3000 to the Wyoming Reads Program and \$38,000 to the Natrona County Library. This included an annual donation of \$28,000 and a one time donation of \$10,000 as a result of Covid-19 grants we received.

Friends of Natrona County Public Library ended the year with 39 volunteers recording a total of 3347 hours of service.



The <u>'Friends of the Natrona County Library'</u> Book Sale didn't start with Betty Ouderkirk and Wilma Bovie, but they certainly became the heart and soul of the sale, as did Kevin Anderson.

All three people spent countless hours in the basement of the <u>Natrona County Public Library</u>, sorting through books, setting them up, selling them, and more. The 'Friends of the Library' Book Sale is absolutely a labor of love, and it has been for the last 50 years.

On Wednesday, the Natrona County Library celebrated and honored Ouderkirk, Bovie, Anderson and other friends on the 50th Anniversary of the 'Friends of the Natrona County Library' Book Sale.

It started in 1973.

According to a brochure timeline provided by the NCPL, "In 1973, Kathleen Hemry and Kevin Anderson 'spent many hours sorting and categorizing books as they came in.' The records of that sale indicate that they ran out of paperbacks before the end of the sale. The early records also indicate that in 1974, the sale had over 1,800 attendees."

Throughout the following 50 years, that number continued to grow and grow - to the point that lines for the book sale went out the door and into the parking lot.

"If my recollection is correct, the library itself held a couple sales starting in something like 1969," Kevin Anderson told K2 Radio News. "It might have been as a result of those sales, or it might have been just a separate coincidence, but then they formed the 'Friends of the Library' and one of the big things has always been the sale. It's always been one of Casper's big cultural events. People don't necessarily think of it as cultural, but when you look at the lines that used to form when the sales were done that way, it was just amazing. Out the door and all the way around. They went out the back door and all the way around to the corner."

In short, they were a big deal.

And they've remained a big deal for the last 50 years.

"The Friends of the Natrona County Library is celebrating a milestone," the brochure read. "2022 is the 50th year of book sales for the organization. The first sale was held in the basement of the 'new' library and the sales still take place there today. Prior to that first sale, volunteers placed drop boxes in grocery stores to collect donated books. Those first volunteers, let by Barbara Gosman, borrowed 37 'heavy' tables and four picnic tables to display their books. Volunteers estimated that they had collected over 10,000 books and the sale raised \$300 the first day with a final total of \$1,730.82. The end of 2022 marks 90 successful sales!"

Throughout those 50 years, many volunteers, many friends, helped out with the book sales. But two people who really stood out, who really make the book sale a priority, who really gave their time, energy, heart and soul, were Betty Ouderkirk and Wilma Bovie.

"After several volunteer sale coordinators, Betty Ouderkirk began chairing the sale in 1979 and Wilma Bovie joined her as chair in 1982," the brochure stated. "These

women spent several decades leading the book sale efforts. In 1984, the sale expanded into two rooms."

Both Ouderkirk and Bovie have since passed, but their legacies remain alive and in tact at the Natrona County Library.

On Wednesday, the library honored the relatives of both women, telling them how vital they both were to the success, and the future, of the Natrona County Public Library.

"She just jumped right into it and it just went from there and snowballed," said Betty's daughter, Diane Kowalski. "It got bigger and bigger and bigger, especially after she retired."

Kowalski said that her mom was so involved with the sales throughout the years, simply because "she loved books."

Kowlaski said that in addition to being one of the lead volunteers for the Natrona County Library book sales, she was also the first woman Landman with Gulf Oil. But when she wasn't trailblazing, she was at the library, sorting through books and organizing them by author.

"They were here probably four or five days a week," Kowalski said. "She liked doing it and she drafted a lot of us to come down, too."

One of those people was Betty's brother, Jerry Quinlan. Quinlan reflected on his sister's life, and offered a quick smile at her memory.

"She was always very kind to me" Quinlan said. "She took good care of me. I was the last of seven, and she was sixth. She always gave me a chance to get some good books down here."

Quinlan said that his sister very quickly established a book collection to be envied.

"She had a wonderful collection of books," he said. "I think they're almost all at Diane's now."

Betty loved books, and so did her friend, Wilma. That love for books, for education, revealed itself in Wilma's career as well.

"She was an ex-teacher," Wilma son, Robert Bovie shared. "She was an elementary school teacher. And she subbed a while. I once had her as a sub in high school. It wasn't fun. But we were a book family. I learned to read at a very young age. And the house is still full of books, 20 years later.

That love of books presented itself in both her career and in her pastime.

"I remember the first time we came to the library, when we first moved here in 1971," Bovie said. "The basement was like the children's area and it was rinky dink shelves like you'd see at the dollar store. It was pretty lackadaisical. But we were in the library a lot in whatever city we were in. I had gone on to college before she got fully invested with the Natrona County Library, but it became very, very important to her very quickly."

And so, for the next few decades, Wilma and Betty, Casper's own Flinstones, led the charge for the 'Friends of the Library' Book Sale.

"The books that she would get, I would help her sort," Bovie said. "SOmetimes on the weekends, I'd come down here and the variety we would receive; it was enormous. You wouldn't think that a smaller community like Casper would have such diveristy. But there's people here of all walks of life, and there's so much knowledge to be had. And people want to share it. The community wants to share it. That's why this is such a success."

And what a success it has been. According to the brochure passed out at the event:

- The Friends now host four sales annually.
- During the last sale, 25 volunteers worked over 210 hours.
- Currently, 42 volunteers volunteer well over 3,000 hours annually. The current volunteers have volunteered over 400 years of service to the Friends.
- In 2021, these volunteers worked over 3512 hours. Even with Covid, the last five years averaged 3066 volunteer hours annually.
- Income from sales currently fund over \$25,000 of donations to the library each year, as monetary donations to the Wyoming Reads program.
- In addition to sales of books, hundreds and even thousands of books are donated annually to schools, programs, and groups in the area.

Lisa Scroggins, the Executive Director of the Natrona County Public Library, told K2 Radio News that the book sale has raised more than \$1 million over the course of its history. Much of that success is due to Ouderkirk, Bovie, and Anderson.

"The money raised really allows us to go from being a library that's serving the people to a library that is embracing all of the awesome things that we do, all of the after school programs and events, and book clubs, and everything else. I wasn't here when Betty and Wilma were here, but I've heard so much about the dynamic duo that they were. But our current friends are just phenomenal people. They come in and support our staff and bring all this stuff in and help out so much. And you can tell it's done genuinely out of love and appreciation, and it just means so much to my staff

when they do that. They make good things happen, and I can't speak highly enough of them."

The current 'Friends of the Library' are entering their 50th year and, throughout those years, they have proven that if it wasn't for them, the Natrona County Public Library would be nowhere near as successful as it is. The success that the Natrona County Public Library has seen is the direct result of the work of the Friends of the Library. It's the direct result of people like Betty Ouderkirk, Wilma Bovie, and Kevin Anderson. They're not just friends of the library; they're friends of the entire community.



Natrona County Public Library to host special sale of 'Star-Trek' books, comics and more

Do you speak Klingon? Lie awake at night trying to decide on your favorite Federation starship? Or maybe just think space is cool?

On Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., the Friends of the Natrona County Public Library will be selling an assortment of "Star Trek" collectibles in the library's Crawford Room.

In addition to a treasure trove of books, comics and games, more obscure items — like a "Star Trek" clock and Barbie and Ken dolls — will be up for grabs, too. The group is also putting other sci fi reading materials not related to "Star Trek" up for sale.

The Friends of the Natrona County Public Library raises money for the library and promotes literacy around the community — by donating books to schools, for instance. As part of its fundraising efforts, the group organizes seasonal sales where visitors can buy books from the library's collection for cheap.

But it's never hosted a sale dedicated to a single franchise, said Sharyle Good, co-president.

The collection was donated by an estate, Good said. Its owner had been amassing "Star Trek" memorabilia for 30 or 40 years.

By late July, Friends of the Library already had 45 boxes worth of it — with "several more" boxes on the way, she said.

Anyone interested in attending the sale must register for an appointment beforehand.

Friends of the Natrona County Library started out with 90 appointment slots. Good ended adding up 10 more.

As of Thursday evening, only 20 remained.

The organization's other sales usually draw between 200 and 300 visitors.

But the attention this one has received is impressive for such a niche demographic, Good said.

"Star Trek" has die-hard fans all over the world. And, as with any fanbase, they can get pretty competitive about merchandise.

Good said one man called her to see if he could have first dibs on some of the DVDs going up for sale.

"He wanted to know, could he buy them, and what the prices were going to be," she said.

Good is happy to give potential buyers more information about the inventory, but the group isn't reserving items for anybody.

As with the Friends of the Natrona County Library's other sales, most of the collection will be sold for bargain prices: \$2 or less. Rarer items will cost more, Good said.



If you are restocking or shelving items during a sale, please, unless the arrangement is clear, place those items on an open section of the shelving. That way, they are not in incorrect positions within the section.



The Friends concluded our 50th year of book sales with a whirlwind of a week. First, we celebrated. We sold a book on corset building. Yes, corsets. We also sold a copy of the Aramic New Testament for \$299! Can you guess what sells best? We have sold 16 books about bamboo (four in the last month) and other fly rods with another 12 on fishing. Currently, we have two sales pending on Amazon. Imagine, one on bamboo fly rods and the other is a popular category - guns.

Laurie reminds us that condition is a prime consideration for selections for Amazon. Anything we send must be in very good condition, although an intact book jacket is not an absolute requirement. If the book makes you raise your eyebrows because you have never seen something like that, it is an Amazon possibility. We do not send library discards.
